Kitain Temple

Kitain Temple was constructed in the Heian era. It is famous for its "room where Ieyasu Tokugawa was born" and "Kasuga no Tsubone (Lady Kasuga)'s dressing room," which were transferred from Edo Castle following the fire that occurred in 1638, and "Gohyaku Rakan (Five-hundred arhats)" in the temple ground.
