## Hobart Walking Tour



**1**. The dock area around Hunter Street was the setting for some of Bryce Courtney's *The Potato Factory* and the **Hope & Anchor Tavern** (originally the Whale Fishery and the oldest pub in Australia) was reputedly a haunt of Ikey Soloman.

- 2. Tasmanian Museum & Art Gallery (TMAG) is the second oldest museum in Australia. They offer free tours Wednesday-Sunday at 11am and 1.30pm, general entry is free. <u>http://www.tmag.tas.gov.au/whats on</u>
- 3. The site of the first Carnegie Library in Australia, opened in July 1907 is now used by the Maritime Museum of Tasmania (corner of Argyle and Davey Streets), entry \$9.00. <u>http://www.maritimetas.org/</u>
- 4. Astrolabe Booksellers (shared site with Ken & Kent Antiques, 3 Morrison Street) specialises in rare, out-of-print, used, second-hand and other hard to find books.
- 5. Salamanca has a couple of interesting book shops. Hobart Book Shop (in Salamanca Square) is a proud independent bookshop. A warm and welcoming place to browse through. Déjà vu Books (77 Salamanca Place) carries second-hand and antiquarian books and they have an excellent range.
- 6. Fullers Bookshop (131 Collins Street) is a leading independent Tasmanian bookshop that has been running since the early 1920s. Pop in and browse, make a purchase and start reading over a coffee or a bite to eat in their cafe.
- 7. Cracked and Spineless New and Used Books (Imperial Arcade, 138 Colllins St) is one of Hobart's quirkier bookshops with a loyal fan-base. Why nnot pop in and have a look around, you won't be disappointed.
- 8. Allport Library & Museum of Fine Arts is one of LINC Tasmania's Heritage Collections. It is located on the ground floor of 91 Murray St. <u>http://www.linc.tas.gov.au/tasmaniasheritage/popular/allport</u>
- **9. Tollhurst's Down Under Bookshop** (88 Elizabeth St), the owner is enthusiastic and friendly, a great second-hand bookshop.
- 10. Walch's Corner (now NAB Bank) was located on the corner of Elizabeth St Mall and Liverpool St. Is the site of one of Hobart's first bookshops. <u>http://www.utas.edu.au/library/companion to tasmanian history/W/</u> <u>Walch.htm</u>
- **11. Rapid Eye Books** (36-38 Sandy Bay Rd) and **Kookaburra Books** (113 Hampton Rd) both deal in second-hand and antiquarian books. Worth a look if you're wandering around the Battery Point environs.
- 12. Further afield but well worth a visit if you're in the North Hobart strip is the absolutely delightful State Cinema Bookstore (375 Elizabeth St, North Hobart). They specialise in non-fiction, travel, art, fashion, architecture, and hand-selected fiction titles. A great place to browse awhile and then go to their cafe and start reading with a glass of wine or coffee and cake. Not on the map but not hard to find.
